GOSPEL MEDITATION

Have you ever wondered why the magi had gold, frankincense, and myrrh? Matthew's Gospel tells us, "Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh" (Matt. 2:11). Why are these things their "treasures"? One possible answer is they were magicians and astrologers, and these three items were the tools of their questionable trade. In offering them to Christ, they demonstrate that they will cease using such items to predict or control life. They place this baby-king, the God of Israel, at the center of their lives, and not their own devices of control, manipulation and prediction.

Isn't that what we need to do, too? Consider, for example, the magical power of money, symbolized by the magi's gold. Seemingly whatever we ask of money, it does. It wields a god-like power over the world. It can predict the future by guaranteeing better outcomes for us — which is why it is such a tempting alternative to trusting in God. The problem is such absolute trust in money enslaves us to the economic forces that make money so powerful. In paying homage to Jesus with "gold" (i.e., tithing), we participate in his authority over (and therefore freedom from) the magical sway of money.

What things in your life do you use to predict or control your future? What in your life seems to give you power over the world? Those are your treasures. Are you tired of feeling enslaved to them? Find a way to open them and give them to Christ, and you will be freer.

They Followed a Star!

When was the last time you looked at the stars? What does the sheer vastness and beauty of the universe evoke in you?

This Sunday, we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany. St. Augustine tells us that this feast marks the time when Jesus began to manifest himself to the Gentiles: not just to the Jewish peoples. This was a radical departure from the idea that Jesus came only to and for a select group of people. The Three Kings represented the universal invitation for all peoples to



know and follow Jesus. Three Kings, each from different countries, saw a bright light in the skies and were inspired to follow it with faith and trust.

The stars were evocative symbols of angels and of the Holy Spirit. They were objects that instilled wonder and awe of God. The Magi had the faith and trust to follow the star to Christ's birth. It pointed the Magi to Christ's presence within our humble human form.

What they found was not a shiny palace, but a poor stable. Yet, they recognized the significance of what they saw: "heaven on earth, earth in heaven, humanity in God, God in humanity, one whom the whole universe cannot contain now enclosed within a tiny child. Their symbolic gifts bear witness: incense for God, gold for a king, myrrh for one who is to die." (Peter Chrysologus, 5C)

For us, in this season of light and new birth, may we, like the three Magi, follow the light that leads us to Christ and worship in wonder at the mystery of the Incarnation. What is the "gift" we wish to offer to God today?

Epiphany
